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#### Superintendent's Report to the Board of Directors

#### April 24, 2019

#### I. Update on Modular Classrooms

a. Grade 6 Classroom

Several outstanding items remain to be completed on the new modular classroom that is now occupied by our second grade 6 classroom. The contractor intends to complete the following items within the next several weeks:

- Modification of classroom whiteboard so as to be consistent with whiteboards elsewhere in the school.
- Removal of a small bank of lockers and installation of three boot rack units (four shelves each).
- Installation of numbered labels on new lockers; repair of scratches on several lockers.
- Installation of air conditioning.
- Exterior landscaping.

#### b. Grade 7 Classroom

At noted in the minutes of the Board meeting of March 13, 2019, the Board has approved several motions with respect to the purchase and installation of a new modular classroom for a second grade 7 classroom in the 2019-20 school year. The following progress has been made with respect to those resolutions:

- As of April 17, 2019, the Greater North Central Francophone Education Region (GNCFER) has agreed to share in the expansion of the parking lot by six parking spaces (three for each school) and to support our school's addition of a new modular classroom. Obtaining this support was one of the conditions established by Alberta Education in order for the purchase of a modular classroom to proceed.
- While waiting for GNCFER's response to the parking lot expansion proposal, a request was presented to Strathcona County that, as an alternative to the continued expansion of our school parking lot and giving consideration to the intent of the GNCFER, at the earliest possible date, to acquire a permanent facility at another location for École Claudette-et-Denis-Tardif, as well as to the fact that our school parking lot is typically under-utilized permission be given to our school to utilize the parking lot of the Smeltzer House Centre for Arts & Culture as overflow parking on those infrequent occasions when it may be needed. Strathcona County is presently giving consideration to this request.
- Pricing on the architectural fees associated with the purchase and installation of a new modular classroom, as well as on the expansion of the parking lot, has been received.

Having obtained agreement from the GNCFER to proceed with the parking lot, we are now in a position to request quotes on the expansion of the parking lot. When those have been received, and a winning bid has been approved by the Board, we will be positioned to request that Alberta Education purchase the modular classroom on our behalf.

#### 2. Other Facility Improvements

Visitors to the school may have observed the large amount of student footwear that often clutters the floor area near the entrances to the school. In order to address this problem, five additional boot racks (16 shelves) were installed in the school over the Easter weekend. These are in addition to three new boot racks (12 shelves) that will be installed as part of the completion of the grade 6 modular classroom installation.

#### 3. Education Platform of United Conservative Party

Attached for the information of directors is the Education Platform of Alberta's United Conservative Party (UCP). Giving consideration to the UCP victory in the April 16 provincial election, to the swearing in of a new cabinet on April 30, and to the recall of the legislature during the third week in May, the Board may wish to review the UCP Education Platform, particularly as it applies to charter schools (see highlighted portions).

Directors are reminded that, among the provisions of the UCP Education Platform is the proclamation of the *Education Act* (2012). With that in mind, the Board may have an interest in reviewing key portions of the *Education Act*, particularly as they apply to charter schools. For example, it may be of interest to the Board that the first iteration of the *Education Act* (Bill 18 – April 2011) provided opportunity for charter schools to obtain a "permanent" charter and for applicants for new charter schools to submit such requests directly to the Minister of Education without first approaching a local public school board with a request for an alternative program. By the time the third and final iteration of the *Education Act* was passed by the legislature (Bill 3 – October 2012), "permanent" charter had been replaced by "continuing" charter and the requirement for a charter school applicant to first request an alternative program from a local board, and be denied, had been restored.

It is further suggested the Board may wish to request that the agenda of the upcoming Spring General Meeting of The Association of Alberta Public Charter Schools (TAAPCS) include opportunity to discuss the implications for charter schools of the implementation of the UCP Education Platform and the proclamation of the Education Act (2012), perhaps as an emergent item.

  Spring General Meeting (SGM) of TAAPCS, to discuss a recommended TAAPCS budget for
  the upcoming year, and to consider suggested changes to the structure of the EAC. These
  changes will be presented at the SGM for consideration by the Association.
- Sherwood Park & District Chamber of Commerce
   Together with Vice Chair Hanson and Secretary-Treasurer Leigh, I was pleased to
   represent our school at the monthly luncheon meeting of the Sherwood Park and District

Chamber of Commerce, held on April 17, 2019. In addition to providing opportunity for networking with members of the business community and to enhancing the profile of our school, this month's luncheon featured a *State of the County Address* by Mayor Rod Frank. Directors may be aware that Mayor Frank is the parent of a former New Horizons School student.

# MAKING LIFE BETTER FOR STUDENTS, PARENTS AND **TEACHERS:**

#### RENEWING EDUCATION

Under the NDP, class sizes in Alberta have continued to increase, math and reading scores have declined, Alberta's successful tradition of school choice has been under attack, the carbon tax has taken valuable resources away from classrooms, and curriculum changes have been taking place largely in secret. Alberta's children deserve an excellent, world-class education that will equip them intellectually, socially, and with jobs-ready skills for life.

To ensure that education is a key advantage for Alberta, a United Conservative government would work with parents, teachers, principals, and trustees to once again make Alberta's schools the diverse, excellent classrooms that all Albertans desire and deserve.

The United Conservatives recognize that every child is unique and that parents, not politicians, know what is best for their children.

#### A United Conservative government will:

- Maintain or increase education funding while seeking greater efficiency by reducing administrative overhead and pushing resources to front line teachers
- Continue to build new schools, while ordering an immediate audit of class sizes to determine what happened to previous funding dedicated to class size reduction, and prioritize public infrastructure funds for schools and health care infrastructure
- End the focus on so-called "discovery" or "inquiry" learning, also known as constructivism, by repealing Ministerial Order #001/2013 and replacing it with a new Ministerial Order which focusses on teaching essential knowledge to help students develop foundational competencies
- Pause the NDP's curriculum review, and broaden consultations to be open and transparent, including a wider range of perspectives from parents, teachers, and subject matter experts

- Curriculum reform should begin by determining the key knowledge and skills that Alberta students should possess by the time of their high school matriculation, written in plain language that students, parents, and teachers can understand
- The curriculum should focus on developing foundational competencies
- Teaching methods should focus on those that produce the best outcomes, such as phonics and proven math instruction methods
- The social studies curriculum should be taught without political bias, offering an objective understanding of Albertan, Canadian, and world history, geography, and civic literacy
- Financial literacy should be a mandatory element woven throughout the curriculum
- Consent must be taught as an essential part of the sexual education curriculum
- Reform student assessment so that students, parents, and teachers can clearly identify areas of strength and weakness. This will include:
  - Bringing back the Grade 3 Provincial Achievement Test
  - Returning to a 50/50 split between Diploma and school grades for Grade 12
  - Implementing language and math assessments for students in grades 1, 2, and 3 to help both parents and teachers understand and assess progress in the critical early years, and remedy where necessary
- Require clear, understandable report cards
- Focus on excellence in outcomes, with measures that include:
  - benchmarking the Alberta education system against leading global jurisdictions
  - ensuring teachers have expertise in subject areas by introducing teacher testing
  - expanding options for schools to facilitate expertise

- requiring that the education faculties in Alberta's universities themselves require that teachers take courses in the subjects they will one day teach in schools.
- Support safe schools that protect students against discrimination and bullying
- Reinforce the need for open, critical debate and thinking as key to lifelong learning
- Proclaim the Education Act (2012), taking effect on September 1, 2019
  - A UCP government will trust the hard work done by those who created the 2012 Education Act, and proclaim that legislation, already passed by the Legislature
  - Unlike the NDP's curriculum review, conducted largely in secret, the Education Act resulted from years of widespread public consultation
- Introduce a Choice in Education Act which will:
  - Affirm parents have primary responsibility for the education of their children
  - Add to the preamble of the *Education Act* recognition of Section 26.3 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which states that "parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children"
  - Protect the status and funding of independent schools in legislation given that they save the public education system \$168 million annually
- Facilitate the creation and operation of new charter schools by:
  - Lifting the cap on the number of charter schools
  - Lifting charter school enrolment caps
  - Allowing charter schools to own property
  - Treating charter schools as priorities above other possible uses for surplus public-school infrastructure
- Support and encourage an expansion of alternative programs in the public system
- Respect the constitutional right to separate schools

- Maintain funding for independent schools and home schoolers at current levels
- Encourage the sharing of busing and infrastructure where appropriate, while respecting the distinctive nature of both systems
- Ensure that requests from parents for blended homeschool programs are facilitated
- Amend the Education Act to implement the Leadership Quality Standards
- Reduce paperwork burdens on teachers, principals, and other school staff, and reduce unnecessary regulatory burdens throughout the system
- Review and implement selected recommendations from the Task Force for Teaching Excellence including:
  - Establishing alternative pathways to teaching certification for those in specialized areas of knowledge
  - Introducing more regular assessment of teacher performance
  - Ensuring subject matter competence
- Review the current funding formula to ensure that rural schools have adequate resources to deliver programs in an equitable way

Subject: Provisional Education Plan 2019/20 – 2021/22

#### **Background:**

Attached for the consideration of the Board of Directors is a draft of the Provisional Education Plan 2019/20 – 2021/22 (the Plan). Development of the Plan is an essential element of the New Horizons School Planning Cycle and is the culmination of a process that gave consideration to multiple data sources and which gathered input from students, staff, parents, administration, and directors. Formal processes that contributed to development of the Plan included a Stakeholder Forum held on February 11, 2019 and a Board Planning Retreat held on March 23, 2019.

Charter school education plans are unique in that, unlike education plans in conventional public school jurisdictions, they constitute both a school plan and a jurisdiction plan. Accordingly, Board members will observe that strategies pertaining to both the operation of the school and the work of the Board are included in this Education Plan.

This is the fourth consecutive year in which the Plan has been presented to the Board at a date in the spring, prior to the completion of the current school year, rather than in the fall of the coming school year, as was previously the case. Obtaining provisional approval at this time of year allows the Plan to influence the preparation of the budget for the coming year (rather than having the budget "drive" the Plan). Further, early adoption of a provisional Plan enables implementation of its priorities and strategies immediately upon the start of the coming school year, rather waiting until November of the coming school year, when final adoption of the Plan will occur.

Opportunity for the Board to make revisions to the Plan, based on additional data sources (e.g. results of the June 2019 administration of provincial achievement tests), and to give it final approval, will be provided at a Board meeting in the fall. The Annual Education Results Report for 2018-19 will also be presented to the Board at that time.



Dear Minister Eggen:

During a recent meeting of our school's Board of Directors, it was noted that almost three years have passed since we last corresponded with respect to the matter of the transfer of title of the building and lands that our school presently occupies. In that context, we value this opportunity to bring the matter to your attention once again and, at the same time, to acquaint you with some recent developments that we feel are germane to the issue.

Let me begin, though, by expressing our Board's sincere thanks for your visit to our school on January 10, 2019. We very much appreciated the opportunity to meet with you and Parliamentary Secretary McKitrick, not only to provide you with a tour of our recently-modernized school facility, but also to interact with you and Ms. McKitrick personally. We are, of course, most grateful for the improvements that the modernization has brought to our school, improvements that benefit our students each and every day.

In that context, we have been pleased as a Board to be in a position to contribute significant funds from our accumulated and capital reserves toward the improvement of our school facility. As noted in our letter to you of April 21, 2016, we previously committed more than \$300,000 of Board funds toward facility improvements during the 2014-15 school year. Then, during our school's major modernization of 2016-17, our Board approved the expenditure of an additional \$50,000 toward facility improvements that were not included in the modernization project. Finally, at our meeting yesterday evening, the Board committed to an expenditure of approximately \$475,000 on the procurement and installation of a new modular classroom, as well as the necessary expansion of our school parking lot, so as to accommodate enrolment growth that is anticipated for the upcoming school year.

We believe that these expenditures demonstrate our Board's long-term commitment to the improvement, enhancement, and ongoing maintenance of our school facility and lands. And, with that in mind, we respectfully request that you provide approval for the title transfer that has been under consideration for the past several years. Further, we anticipate that such an approval would be welcomed in our school community as a timely indication of your support for our school specifically, and for public charter schools in our province generally.

Although not directly related to the ownership issue, this correspondence nevertheless provides opportunity to draw to your attention that we continue to enjoy a positive, productive working relationship with École Claudette-et-Denis-Tardif, the Francophone school that shares our campus. Although student enrolments at both schools continue to grow, thus placing greater and greater pressure on our respective school facilities, as well as on traffic in the surrounding neighbourhood, we have nevertheless made things work in a manner that provides all students with a safe and productive learning environment. Moreover, our respective administrations, both at the school and jurisdiction levels, are working well together, both in day-to-day school operations and in planning for the future growth and development of each school.

Finally, we extend to you our thanks for the support that you have shown to our school over the years and for the words of support and encouragement that you have provided to public charter schools on many occasions during your administration.

- can't turn students who fit within a charter away as long as there is space and resources for them; and
- can't charge tuition or make a profit.

Public charter schools are a significant and important option for students in Alberta's education system, providing students and their families with a distinct voice. Currently, Alberta public charter schools have 9,500 enrolled students and approximately 15,000 students on waiting lists. Our over 100,000 past graduate students and their families have all contributed their voices and commitment to growing and sustaining these unique Alberta learning communities.

Research informed innovation, which is made possible by our focused charter environments, has helped stimulate growth and development of specialty-focused educational alternative programs throughout the Alberta education system.

Some of Alberta's public charter schools have been recognized as among the best in the province by various educational research organizations.

New Horizons School, located in Sherwood Park, was established in 1995 as Canada's first public charter school. Our mission is to meet the special academic needs of gifted learners in a congregated setting and in an environment that is low-anxiety, positive, and supportive of the individual. Gifted students need opportunities to be challenged, to think alternatively, and to pursue learning according to their own learning styles – we are proud to provide this learning option to students and families in Strathcona County and the surrounding area.

It is important that as a community we engage with parties and candidates to ensure that their platform policies related to education are informed and supportive of sustaining and growing public charter schools in Alberta's education system.
